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ORDINANCE NO 2008-28s

An Ordinance of the Pierce County Council Establishing a New Arterial Roadway Beyond the East Limit of 128th Street East and 198th Street East on the Bonney Lake Plateau in the Vicinity of **Rhodes Lake Road East**

Whereas the Pierce County Council adopted Resolution No R2001 80 declaring its intention and the public necessity to establish a new County roadway in the vicinity of Rhodes Lake Road from State Route (SR) 162 to 198th Avenue East (known herein as the Rhodes Lake Road Corridor Study) and

Whereas the current Pierce County Comprehensive Plan Transportation Element designates the current Rhodes Lake Road East Road as a medium priority recommendation for geometric shoulder and grade improvements and

Whereas the Pierce County Department of Public Works and Utilities initiated the Rhodes Lake Road Corridor Study process in 2003 in response to Council Resolution No R2001 80 and

Whereas on October 5 2004 the Pierce County Department of Planning and Land Services Environmental Official determined that an environmental impact statement (EIS) should be prepared in conjunction with the corridor study and

Whereas the Pierce County Comprehensive Plan designates a portion of the Orting plateau area south of Bonney Lake and east of the Puyallup River as an Employment Based Planned Community (EBPC) and

Whereas the Rhodes Lake Road Corridor Study environmental analysis indicates that the current zoning for the EBPC could realize approximately 10 300 additional residential units and 9 600 additional jobs by 2030 and

Whereas the Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS) scoping and subsequent expanded scoping for this project resulted in the consideration of additional action alternatives including the South Plateau Connection Angeline Road interchange with SR 410 and the 214th Avenue East Corridor improvements and

Whereas the DEIS released on June 6 2007 evaluated four final alternatives 45 based on their respective impacts on traffic/mobility and impacts on the natural and built environment and also considered the traffic and mobility impacts and the relative ease or difficulty in which the alternative could be implemented and

Whereas the Rhodes Lake Road Corridor Final Programmatic Environmental Impact Study (FEIS) released on January 11 2008 provided direct responses to questions and comments generated in the course of the project's DEIS review period and

Whereas the Rhodes Lake Road Corridor Study inclusive of the DEIS and FEIS process reached the key conclusions that

- a The no build alternative would not be acceptable because of severe congestion on the Plateau and much higher volumes on the current Rhodes Lake Road East than for which the facility is suited
- b Improving the current Rhodes Lake Road East to Major Arterial standards would be very costly have high wetland impacts and be less effective for mobility than other options
- c The mid valley corridor options would be most effective for meeting the future east west travel demand to and from the Plateau. These mid valley options included Alternative B (a new road off the Plateau with a new river crossing and roadway across the valley to connect into the Military Road/SR 162 intersection) and Alternative D (a new road off the Plateau connecting to the existing Puyallup river bridge at 128th Street East)
- d Alternative D offers the best balance of accommodating travel demand while minimizing impacts to people and the natural environment
- e The subject corridor would be an important part of the greater transportation network needed to serve the plateau but would need to be supplemented with other facilities at some point in the future and

Whereas the Rhodes Lake Road East New Alternative Corridor Route Establishment report recommends that the County should consider a number of specific principles in mitigating the impact of the construction of a new roadway corridor including

- a The minimization of the roadway cross section (number of lanes/width)
- b The minimization of spillover" illumination
- c The implementation of additional access management tools
- d The modification of transportation concurrency to ensure the adequacy of the county transportation facilities with constructed development
- e The coordination with WSDOT to update their Route Development Plan for SR 162

 f The exploration of methods by which to minimize the visual impact of this new corridor and

Whereas it is recognized that the project level EIS that must be performed prior to construction will more closely examine project specific environmental impacts and appropriate mitigation and

Whereas the County Engineer has submitted the Rhodes Lake Road East New Alternative Corridor Route Establishment report which is attached hereto as Exhibit A and made a part hereof by this reference and

Whereas the Pierce County Council did fix a time and place for a hearing on the Corridor Establishment Report and did conduct said hearing all in accordance with the requirements of Revised Code of Washington 36 81 070 Now Therefore

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of Pierce County

Section 1 The Pierce County Council has reviewed the Rhodes Lake Road Corridor project's DEIS FEIS and County Engineer's Report and determined it is in the public s best interest to establish the new corridor

Section 2 A new County arterial road is hereby established as two distinct sections as described in the County Engineer's Report and summarized as follows

Section A A new corridor with four through lanes plus appropriate turn lanes from 128th Street East to the intersection with the extension of Falling Water Boulevard and a future connector into the Cascadia development approximately 1 13 miles

The new corridor begins at the eastern end of the existing bridge over the Puyallup River on 128th Street East/ McCutcheon Road. The new corridor would become the through road with McCutcheon becoming the cross road. The new corridor would curve to the south rising on an embankment to gain elevation before reaching the eastern wall of the Puyallup River Valley. The roadway would then transition to a side hill cut into the eastern wall of the valley. It would continue south until enough elevation is gained to allow a curve to the east to reach the top of the plateau. The roadway would continue easterly to a future intersection with the extension of Falling Water Boulevard.

Section B A new corridor with two through lanes plus appropriate turn lanes from the current terminus of Falling Water Boulevard to the intersection with the Section A Corridor approximately 0 93 miles

The new corridor will begin at the current western terminus of Falling Water Boulevard and continue to the southwest to the intersection with the Section A corridor

- 1 <u>Funding</u> Developers Transportation Impact Fees and other fees are supposed to pay for this road. Why are County taxes being considered to fund this project?
- 2 Allowing it to be built without SR 162 as a four lane highway There was no data on this scenario Page 14 of Appendix J in the FEIS states capacity improvements on SR 162 and SR 410 are key to the operation of the east Pierce County Road network

Without data on this option and in light of this statement and common sense this new roadway cannot be built before SR 162 is widened

3 <u>Safety</u> – the primary purpose of the County Transportation division is to ensure the safety of its citizens as they travel the County roadways. Allowing Rhodes Lake Road to be constructed before the assumptions are in place especially widening SR 162 would drive commuters to use less desirable local roads such as McCutcheon road which is too unsafe in the roadbed and width as well as curves on the steep hillside route that is without guard rails a very hazardous scenario under the best of conditions. The same argument stated in the Engineer's Report regarding the current Rhodes Lake Road applies to McCutcheon. Rhodes Lake Road East is not suitable to serve as a major arterial, but given its location, travel demand will force its use as an arterial unless an alternate route is developed. That alternative is widening SR 162.

A second safety issue is the widening of Military Road Before that assumption should be made the County needs to ask the Transportation Department to make a realistic assessment of what that project would involve. With a similar topography to McCutcheon and Rhodes Lake Road it is a challenging concept exacerbated with 17 access points in less than one mile along the hillside. This creates a safety concern to turn onto or off that road. If you add a lane and encourage hundreds more vehicles to use that route how do you provide a safe traveling environment? How do you justify the cost/benefit of this road with these issues?

- 4 Noise Noise was a recurring theme in all of the public comments. Because this is a rural community, and the County has repeatedly stated that it desires to retain this rural environment, the noise level is a primary issue in retaining the rural character. I am sure you know that Low Frequency Noise (LFN) is generally accepted to be associated with transportation corridors. It can be felt and heard and its presence is recognized as an environmental polluter that can negatively affect human beings and animals. Why was that environmental impact not included in the EIS? How can the noise factor of the level of traffic that has been projected for this project be mitigated?
- 5 Farming community/economy Building this highway will bring development. This should be one of the assumptions. The county must decide what is trump. Is the rural community and farming a higher priority than development? In light of increasing alarm around the world for food production, it puts a greater pressure to preserve this precious

resource This is an opportunity to make a very clear statement, to County residents and developers alike that the County is dead serious about strengthening the agricultural economy

- 6 Public Transit an issue that continues to build in concern across the county is access to public transit. As fuel prices rise the public is seeking alternatives not to mention the environmental concerns of emissions. This proposal offers no transit opportunities. When you consider over 10 000 new residential units yielding approximately 20 000 new travelers a public transit option needs to be included in this study and as integral in this project. Will you require this to be included?
- 7 Engineer's Report There are several elements in the Engineer's Report that beg questions and deserve your attention
 - a Page 4 likely need to be supplemented with other facilities What do you have in mind?
 - b Page 8 minimizing impacts to people and the natural environment. How about the viewshed? How about property values as their views are destroyed?
 - c Page 10. The directional descriptions are inaccurate. Review that again
 - d Page 11 Reference to public funding All of Rhodes Lake Road is to be paid for by the developers not the county
 - Page 20 Refers to the traffic on 128th increasing more than ten-fold to almost 3800. Is that considered a rural standard?

 Also refers to the rich agricultural soils and the assurance that the County is making efforts to retain the agricultural economy. There is no doubt all of this would be compromised by a decision to build this road. Reference to the indirect impacts to farming with traffic congestion making it more difficult to get products to market. It also is a huge impact to transport farming equipment. That should be added to all documents. Will you do that?
 - f Page 21 Provide landscape buffers to minimize noise and visual impact Please document effective landscape that mitigates noise Please provide options that are being considered to minimize the visual impact. Enhance the County's transportation concurrency systems What does that mean?

Coordinate with WSDOT to update their Route Development Plan for SR 162 Does this mean this road won t be built until it can be in coordination of SR 162 being funded and scheduled for widening?

Please take these concerns and the concerns sent to you by other valley residents and return this study to the team to address the inconclusive data and information. This is information the County needs before it can make an informed and wise decision on this very critical issue. It is information the public needs to be aware of the full and true impact of this proposal.

STATEMENT TO PIERCE COUNTY ECONOMIC AND INFRASTRUCTURE COMMITTEE April 28 2008

As I understand the permits for the plateau developments the developers are required to provide the required transportation mitigation. The proposal for Rhodes Lake Road was for improvements to the existing structure not a new road. I was told by Jesse and others over the course of this project that Transportation Impact Fees and other developer fees are paying for this and the accompanying assumed improvements. Explain how those fees are going to take care of it the actual dollars, and why then you are proposing taxes for it.

As stated in the FEIS all of the assumptions must be in place to create the impact as stated. The graphs in the FEIS show the effect of each of the options including a no build option. The ordinance that is proposed to you today is to select Option D, the alignment that draws all the traffic from the plateau to 128th Street and SR162. If the assumptions are not in place, it is a far worse effect than a no build. You would be allowing literally thousands of vehicle trips to an already overcapacity road. This impact was not charted even though it is the most likely scenario since the State has no plans in the near or distant future to change SR162.

The assumption that SR162 is going to be made into a five lane highway has the biggest impact on the success of the proposal. The FEIS states that the capacity improvements on SR162 and SR410 are key to the operation of the east Pierce County Road network. The County cannot make assumptions about State Highways that are not consistent with the project list and timeline of the State Department of Transportation. Until and unless the State changes their project list and SR162 upgrades are included in the same time schedule as the Rhodes Lake Road project, the County cannot consider it a future reality especially in the time frame proposed for this project. The report further says uncertainty in the timing of these improvements is not a reason to delay the construction of a Rhodes Lake Road corndor (Refer to page 14 of Appendix J.)

1 Does building a new Rhodes Lake Road Corridor make things better or worse if SR 162 and/or SR 410 have not been widened?

Any of the build alternatives will improve average condition in the study area, and will therefore make things better

Where is the proof? That scenario was not proposed in the charts and graphs Please provide the scenario of conditions if the new road is built and SR162 and/or SR410 are not widened

This is considering the impact only on the plateau not the valley or the SR 410 interchange at Sumner. This statement completely disregards the impact on the valley Conditions would be seriously worsened by building this road without the assumed improvements to SR162 especially as noted in the statement that it is key to the success of the transportation network. Does the County value the valley, the rural community and the agricultural economy? This statement implies these issues are not a concern and are not related to this decision.

2 Does the uncertain timing for widening SR 162 and SR 410 make a different option than Alternative D a more logical Preferred Alternative?

Alternative B would be the best performing alternative from a traffic perspective under the original Baseline assumptions. Its benefits for traffic would be amplified even more in the interim period before SR 162 is widened. However, Alternative D (the second best performer for traffic) was recommended by the Project Leadership Team as the best blend of the competing goals of moving traffic east west and preserving the

character of the valley The PLT has confirmed this recommendation even in the scenario where a Rhodes Lake Road corridor is constructed prior to improvements on SR 162 and SR 410

How does D preserve the character of the valley better than B when D creates a whole new area of viewshed destruction? B utilizes the already destroyed area of the gravel mine and Falling Water clearcut

Allowing Rhodes Lake Road to be constructed before the assumptions are in place especially the widening of SR 162 would drive commuters to use less desirable local roads such as McCutcheon Road which is too unsafe in the roadbed and width as well as curves on the steep hillside route that is without guard rails a very hazardous scenario under the best of conditions. The same argument stated in the Engineer's Report regarding the current Rhodes Lake Road applies to McCutcehon. Rhodes Lake Road East is not suitable to serve as a major arterial but given its location, travel demand will force its use as an arterial unless an alternate route is developed. In this case an expanded SR 162 to accommodate the expected demand. McCutcheon has already seen a significant increase in traffic that has been reflected in an increase in accidents. The primary purpose of Pierce County is transportation decisions is to ensure the safety of its citizens as they travel the County roadways. You really must give this serious consideration. The Assumptions must be in place before this road is completed and it must be stated so in the Ordinance. The weak verbiage as written is inadequate to assure the regular commuters or the general public that this proposed Ordinance is providing for a safe roadway network.

Let s also take a look at the assumption of adding a climbing lane to Military Road. Before that assumption should be made the County needs to ask the Transportation Department to make a realistic assessment of what that project would involve. It is a challenging concept with the steep hillside narrow right of way and the number of access points in less than a mile. Once again, the County's primary responsibility is to provide safe roadways and this will be a challenging project when you consider there are 17 access points in less than one mile along a hillside that is difficult to have clear distance vision for traffic to safely turn onto or off that road. If you add a lane, at what will be an exorbitant cost, and encourage hundreds more vehicles to use that route, how do you provide a safe traveling environment? How do you justify the cost/benefit of this road with these issues? I would like you to answer my questions.

Let s also take a look at the FEIS itself and the issues that were raised by the community in all of the public comment periods that the County had on this project. One of the important issues raised by the community was not included or addressed at all in the environmental impact statements. That specific issue was the noise impact. Because this is a rural community, and the County has repeatedly stated on numerous occasions that it desires to retain this rural environment — it is even referred to in the Engineer's Report on page 20 — the noise level is a primary issue in retaining a rural character. I am sure you know that Low Frequency Noise is generally accepted to be associated with transportation corridors. It can be felt and heard and its presence is recognized as an environmental polluter that can negatively affect human beings and animals. Why was that environmental impact not included in the EIS? How can the noise factor of the level of traffic that has been projected for this project be mitigated?

Another aspect is the farming community and the agricultural economy that the County has repeatedly and consistently said they want to support and develop. Building this highway will bring development. The safeguards you think you have put in place for retaining the farmland will not be effective in the face of this level of environmental and character compromise and

degradation The County must decide what is trump. Is the rural community and farming a higher priority than development? You can develop anywhere but you can't farm anywhere And in light of the increasing alarm around the world for food production, it puts a greater pressure to preserve this precious resource. If the County decides to build this highway, it is making a clear statement to the developers that it is open season, development trumps agriculture and the rural community. It tells the farmers and landowners that all the talk about supporting farming and the rural community was just window dressing and political rhetoric. This is an opportunity to make a very clear statement, to County residents and developers alike that the County is dead serious about strengthening the agricultural economy.

Another missing piece in the FEIS is reference to the Alderton McMillin Community Plan though the Engineer's Report does acknowledge it. Though the Project Leaders claim to have worked with the Community Planning Board nothing written in the Community Plan that refers to the project is included there is absolutely no reference at all in the FEIS to the Community Plan Key point is that the Board unanimously and strongly agreed no new roads should be built to the valley. Another very critical issue is the retention of the valley viewshed. This alignment is clearly a dreadful impact on the viewshed as I already mentioned.

An issue that continues to build in concern across the county is access to public transit. As fuel prices rise alternatives must be made available to commuters to take cars off the road and provide commute options. This proposal offers no transit opportunities. This is a great disservice to the east county residents. When you consider over 10 000 new residential units yielding approximately 20 000 new travelers, a public transit option needs to be included in this study and as integral in this project.

Many other questions comments and concerns have been brought to your attention in letters from the community people who have the very quality of their lives at stake here. Not the people who were on the Project Leadership Team whose lives were not at stake. I hope you read all of your e-mail this morning. Pay attention to these comments and concerns and multiply each by about 10 to realize the depth of sincerity, the heart and soul behind these concerns. Time does not allow me to summarize all of my concerns and additional concerns of my neighbors.

This committee needs to bring all of these concerns facts and issues into focus and remand the study back to the study team to address all of the missing pieces and give more direct and specific responses to the questions the local residents your constituents pose

Dear Committee

As you consider the proposal to develop a new transportation arterial in the vicinity of Rhodes Lake Road we would like to remind you of two issues connected with expanding roads in the area to handle projected long term traffic demand

- The need to preserve the County's dwindling farm land in the Puyallup valley by diverting high traffic volumes away from the valley floor and
- 2) The need to consider alternatives to handling peak traffic volumes with traditional roadway expansion

Local traffic demand is driven by the recent population growth on the Orting Plateau and there's an expectation that this rate of growth will continue in the future. Growth in population is expected to be accompanied by more privately owned vehicle (POV) traffic to and from the Plateau.

Regarding agricultural land preservation the recently issued Final Environmental Impact Statement (FEIS) for the Rhodes Lake Road Corridor Study suggests the County is strongly considering a major arterial route on an east west axis across the valley floor to handle POV traffic. We suggest that any new roads particularly on and near the Plateau should be designed with the objective of keeping high volume POV traffic out of the valley area as much as possible since it is the antithesis of maintaining an agricultural environment. We contend that land use is altered by the presence of increased traffic volumes, and the situation in the Puyallup Valley between Orting and Sumner will be no exception. More non-agricultural development will ultimately follow the traffic so if we want to maintain the rural character of this area, we need to plan transportation corridors around it, not through it.

As far as building new transportation systems they are expensive whatever approach is taken. Because POV traffic often has a characteristic daily cycle with peaks and valleys transportation engineers have traditionally focused on sizing roads to handle those extremes when planning for traffic demand. But given the accelerating costs of energy particularly the fuel that makes the noted POV traffic possible, it seems the time is ripe for Pierce County to anticipate a new type of demand, demand for improved public transportation. Rather than following the traditional approach of accommodating growing peak traffic volumes with ever bigger roads, perhaps the County would be better off studying ways to connect people and their destinations in a more energy efficient and environmentally friendly way. This means setting a different course by having our transportation engineers concentrate more on mass transit alternatives, particularly buses, than arterial road design as a solution to traffic demand. If we don't I suspect we will soon be looking back at this time as a missed opportunity as we all struggle to pay more burdensome pump prices.

ORDINANCE NO 2008

An Ordinance of the Pierce County Council establishing a new arterial roadway beyond the east limit of 128th Street East and 198th Street East on the Bonney Lake Plateau in the Vicinity of Rhodes Lake Road East

Whereas the Pierce County Council adopted Resolution R2001-80 declaring its intention and the public necessity to establish a new County roadway in the vicinity of Rhodes Lake Road from SR 162 to 198th Avenue East (Known herein as the Rhodes Lake Road Corridor Study) and

Whereas the current Pierce County Comprehensive Plan Transportation Element designates the current Rhodes Lake Road East Road as a medium priority recommendation for geometric shoulder and grade improvements and

Whereas the Pierce County Department of Public Works and Utilities initiated the Rhodes Lake Road Corridor Study process in 2003 in response to Council Resolution R2001-80 and

Whereas on October 5 2004 the Pierce County Department of Planning and Land Services Environmental Official determined that an environmental impact statement (EIS) should be prepared in conjunction with the corridor study and

Whereas the Pierce County Comprehensive Plan designates a portion of the Orting plateau area south of Bonney Lake and east of the Puyallup River as an Employment Based Planned Community (EBPC) and

Whereas the Rhodes Lake Road Corridor Study environmental analysis indicates that the current zoning for the EBPC could realize approximately an additional 10 300 additional residential units and 9 600 additional jobs by 2030 and

Whereas the Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS) scoping and subsequent expanded scoping for this project resulted in the consideration of additional action alternatives including the South Plateau Connection Angeline Road interchange with SR 410 and the 214th Avenue East Corridor improvements and

Whereas the DEIS released on June 6 2007 evaluated four final alternatives based on their respective impacts on traffic/mobility and impacts on the natural and built environment and also considered the traffic and mobility impacts and the relative ease or difficulty in which the alternative could be implemented and

 Whereas the Rhodes Lake Road Corridor Final Programmatic Environmental impact Study (FEIS) released on January 11 2008 provided direct responses to questions and comments generated in the course of the project's DEIS review period and

Whereas the Rhodes Lake Road Corridor Study inclusive of the DEIS and FEIS process reached the four key conclusions that

- a The no build alternative would not be acceptable because of severe congestion on the Plateau and much higher volumes on the current Rhodes Lake Road East than for which the facility is suited
- b Improving the current Rhodes Lake Road East to Major Arterial standards would be very costly have high wetland impacts and be less effective for mobility than other options
- The mid valley corridor options would be most effective for meeting the future east west travel demand to and from the Plateau. These mid valley options included Alternative B (a new road off the Plateau with a new river crossing and roadway across the valley to connect into the Military Road/SR 162 intersection) and Alternative D (a new road off the Plateau connecting to the existing Puyallup river bridge at 128th Street East)
- d Alternative D offers the best balance of accommodating travel demand while minimizing impacts to people and the natural environment
- e The subject corndor would be an important part of the greater transportation network needed to serve the plateau but would need to be supplemented with other facilities at some point in the future and

Whereas the Rhodes Lake Road East New Alternative Corndor Route Establishment report recommends that the County should consider a number of specific principles in mitigating the impact of the construction of a new roadway corridor including

- a The minimization of the roadway cross section (number of lanes/width)
- b The minimization of spillover illumination
- c The implementation of additional access management tools
- d The modification of transportation concurrency to ensure the adequacy of the county transportation facilities with constructed development
- e The coordination with WSDOT to update their Route Development Plan for
- f The exploration of methods by which to minimize the visual impact of this new corridor and

Whereas it is recognized that the project level EIS that must be performed prior to construction will more closely examine project specific environmental impacts and appropriate mitigation and

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Whereas the County Engineer has submitted the Rhodes Lake Road East New Atternative Corridor Route Establishment report which is attached hereto as Exhibit A and made a part hereof by this reference and

Whereas the Pierce County Council did fix a time and place for a hearing on the Corridor Establishment Report and did conduct said hearing all in accordance with the requirements of RCW 36 81 070

Now Therefore

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of Pierce County

Section 1 The Pierce County Council has reviewed the Rhodes Lake Road Corridor project's DEIS FEIS and County Engineer's Report and determined it is in the public's best interest to establish the new corridor

Section 2 A new County arterial road is hereby established as two distinct sections as described in the County Engineer's Report and summarized as follows

Section A. A new corridor with four through lanes plus appropriate turn lanes from 128th Street East to the intersection with the extension of Falling Water Boulevard and a future connector into the Cascadia development approximately 1 13 miles

The new corndor begins at the eastern end of the existing bridge over the Puyallup River on 128th Street East/ McCutcheon Road. The new corridor would become the through road, with McCutcheon becoming the cross road. The new corndor would curve to the south rising on an embankment to gain elevation before reaching the eastern wall of the Puyallup River Valley The roadway would then transition to a side-hill cut into the eastern wall of the valley it would continue south until enough elevation is gained to allow a curve to the east to reach the top of the plateau. The roadway would continue easterly to a future intersection with the extension of Falling Water Boulevard

Section B A new corridor with two through lanes plus appropriate turn lanes from the current terminus of Falling Water Boulevard to the intersection with the Section A Corridor approximately 0 93 miles

The new corridor will begin at the current western terminus of Falling Water Boulevard and continue to the southwest to the intersection with the Section A corridor 1

Section 3 The roadway centerline description found within the County Engineer's Report provides an approximation of the new corridor location. The specific alignment is subject to change based on additional engineering to meet design intent

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

Dear Committee members

The original framework as I understood it was that prior to constructing the Rhodes Lakes Extension into the valley improvements would be made on the interchanges at SR 162 and SR 410. It does not appear that this ordinance addresses those improvements. This proposed ordinance would seem to benefit only developers and does not honor the intent of the residents in the Alderton –McMillan planning area. It would seem the year s residents spent establishing a vision for our valley has been a wasted effort. I feel disrespected. We were ask to compromise and give up some of what we felt was best for our valley. Why are developers not held to the same standards? We have been the sad witnesses to the rape of our beautiful forested hillsides. That hillside is our view a selling point for our homes and property. As I gaze on it today it often reminds me of Appalachia after the clear cutters and strip miners finished. We are faced with ever increasing traffic noise vehicles whizzing by pedestrians and bicycles at speeds in excess of the posted limit. Has there been a noise impact study? If not it would seem one is in order

I remain adamantly opposed to creating more access and traffic in a lahar zone With this extension there will be even more political pressure to sponsor other ordinances for further residential and commercial development in the valley A 40 FOOT WALL OF MUD CAN CAUSE CATASTROPHIC DEATH AND PROPERTY DAMAGE

Was the condition of current infrastructure including bridges assessed for increased traffic impact and does this ordinance address fixing that infrastructure? The reality is that most motorists who commute take either McCutcheon or short cut onto 96th St to avoid SR 162. The pavement attached to the bridge on both sides is sinking. It takes the brunt of truck traffic from a commercial operation on Riverside and sand/gravel trucks going up the hill. The noise is extremely loud when the trucks enter and exit the bridge. Does this ordinance include funding to fix the current infrastructure that will impacted by the increased wear and tear?

I would also like to see transit on 162 My plans are to use transit on days when I am going to be in the office all day Currently I have to drive to Sumner station If the proposed ordinance passes expect more gridlock than is currently the case Transit would offset part of that gridlock Has there been a survey of transit needs on SR 162?

It is most unfortunate that I will be unable to attend your meeting this afternoon to personally testify during the discussion of the Proposal No 2008 28 coming before you today I would sincerely like to have my three minutes to address your group

I moved to the Puyallup valley a little over five years ago and I have fallen in love with the area. It has grown to become the place I truly call home. To stand before you today and testify for three minutes three hours or even three days would simply not be enough time to completely explain my position as it relates to the proposed new arterial. My thoughts and feelings surely come from a NIMBY point of view. They are undeniably unfounded assumptions based upon my own personal feelings. They are undocumented and surely not based upon fact. Much like this corridor study itself.

Over the past four years I ve accumulated nearly a file cabinet full of documents concerning this project. Many were supplied publicly by the County staff many were acquired through public record searches and some through formal written requests. I ve testified several times concerning this proposed project before your Council as a citizen and resident of Pierce County as a member of the Puyallup Valley Preservation Group and more recently as a member of the Alderton/McMillin Community Planning Board

In preparation for today s meeting I ve once again spent over a week sifting through my files. Now after four years of effort frustration and aggravation. I ve finally concluded that the County has a very clear picture of where it assumes we will be in the year 2030. It is just pretty darn hard to see how well actually end up there. There is no doubt that this project will finally be approved. In my mind that was truly decided several years ago and all the work that has been undertaken since then has been sculpted to support that one selected goal.

The assumptions your staff have used to support this project may happen or maybe they just might not happen at all Could any one of us predicted twenty five years ago that gas would be pushing \$4 00 a gallon today or that we d be faced with today s mortgage crisis or food shortages beginning to appear world wide? I think not I also think that the assumptions being made here will turn out to be just as inaccurate

I ask that you the five committee members give at least give some consideration to just four of the assumptions that truly drive this arterial establishment. Just how probable are any of these issues in the foreseeable future?

- The first is that Cascadia will build out as planned. Once again I point out that today there has never been a planned employment based community built any where in Pierce County western Washington or for that matter any where else in this country that has achieved a 27% internalization of traffic. This figure is unheard of and one that this whole study has used to project expected traffic demands and peak hour traffic numbers.
- 2 Second SR162 will be widened to five lanes from the Puyallup River crossing south of McMillin north to SR410
- 3 Third that Military Road will be widened from the narrow winding pathway that it is today to three lanes up the hill to South Hill
- 4 And lastly that the SR410/SR162 interchange will be improved to accommodate the additional traffic burden

The project findings do clearly state that even if some or all of these assumed improvements are not made the new corridor will in fact provide benefits over a no build scenario. I suppose one could argue that point but I feel it would be meaningless again to do so at this late date.

Putting all personal feelings aside I simply ask that you think about the impacts of past assumptions your planning staff have made their accuracy and ability to correctly predict the future I can only hope that you too will see the great potential for errors and the detrimental resulting impacts

The point I m trying to make here is one that I hope you can support. Since so much of our future and tax dollars are riding on these developer's projections. I ask that you some how the their future development phases on their ability to fulfill their plans for providing jobs and employment on the plateau. If they cannot internalize the traffic volumes that they have assumed then they too should not be allowed to continue development.

Thank you for your time and consideration of this issue I look forward to seeing the recommendation your group puts forth to the full Council later this year

On July 10 2001 the Pierce County Council passed resolution R2001 80 declaring its intent to establish a new roadway described as being beyond the east limit of 128th Street East and 198th Street East on the Bonney Lake Plateau in the Vicinity of Rhodes Lake Road East This resolution directed the County Engineer to report upon such project to the Pierce County Council

The attached ordinance data sheet and County Engineer's Report prepared for your review and approval respond to the above resolution. I would summarize a number of important aspects of this corridor establishment as follows.

Council Consideration

This measure will go before the Council's Economic Infrastructure Committee (EIDC) on April 28 of this year

The Recommended Alignment

The attached County Engineer's Report recommends that should a corridor be constructed to serve the subregional travel needs of the next twenty years that it should connect the eastern terminus of 128th Street East to the existing Falling Water Boulevard East and provide access to the Cascadia development. It is estimated that such a corridor would cost up to \$78 Million exclusive of mitigation.

Interagency Cooperation

The Rhodes Lake Road Corridor Study process relied heavily upon the input of the Project Leadership Team (PLT) that provided guidance in the environmental study process. The PLT reviewed critiqued and offered recommendations throughout the study

Departmental Policy Coordination

The alignment of this roadway establishment would affect a portion of the rural community within Pierce County The County Executive's letter to the County Council of November 14 2007 provided the principles of mitigation which are reflected in the County Engineer's Report. This department and Planning and Land Services have coordinated in the development of strategies by which to mitigate the impacts of this roadway. We anticipate and welcome future discussions with PALS and others should this corridor be established and proceed to implementation.

Dear Council

As you consider the above referenced ordinance and it's long term implications for the environment and Pierce County's transportation infrastructure we think it timely to listen to the words of House Speaker Nancy Pelosi in her recent (June 2 2008) address to the American Public Transportation Association Rail Conference in San Francisco where she praised that group for getting people out of their cars and onto light rail light rail trolleys and commuter rail for example Already public transit saves our nation 1 4 billion gallons of gasoline every year

Speaker Pelosi also noted that The fuel savings from using transit are magnified when we add in the smart growth that springs up around transit especially rail transit stations. People use transit for more of their daily needs such as running errands and the nation saves 4.2 billion gallons of gasoline annually

A key message in Speaker Pelosi's address is that it's time to focus on public transportation infrastructure as a solution to moving people and goods. That message applies not only to large urban areas, but to smaller and less densely settled communities like Pierce County's suburbs—in her words, the task of building and modernizing public transportation infrastructure—is so large that it demands the involvement of every level of government and the private sector.

The current crisis over oil and gasoline energy prices is just the latest in a series of such supply and demand emergencies over recent decades. The situation will eventually be resolved in one fashion or another but not without some serious economic disruption. The historical take home message is that the community will be continually at risk of such economic disruption unless we have viable alternatives to privately owned vehicle POV transportation. Rather than promote the development of arterial roadways to handle POV transportation the County needs to heed Speaker Pelosi's call and take the lead in moving towards a better public transit infrastructure.

Moving towards public transit and away from conventional road development make sense from a general environmental standpoint as well Pierce County is struggling to find ways to preserve its valuable farm land in the Alderton McMillan area Bringing more traffic into the heart of this area will likely accelerate the transformation of the landscape from rural and agricultural to higher density suburban development

While sometimes it's hard to see strong connections between the establishment of transportation infrastructure and changes in land use due to the myriad incremental steps along the way it's clear that putting ever larger numbers of people in daily commuting proximity to the farming areas is going to result in opportunities and demands for land use change away from agricultural use

In short, there is no absolute certainty about land use change in this direction, but the probability that land use change will come about is magnified by the addition of a transportation corridor. The County can better achieve long term transportation needs and promote farm land preservation by not developing a major POV-oriented arterial into the heart of the Puyallup valley.

Finally by the County's admission traffic volumes on SR 162 are degrading the level of service now

It s also clear that building a new arterial before enhancing SR 162 to accommodate future traffic (let alone the current volumes) is putting the cart before the horse. Citizen's who face that traffic congestion every

day on SR 162 brought this up in comments on the Rhodes Lake Road Draft EIS

But the voters defeated the RTID ballot measure in November 2007 They could certainly do it again Voters may be discouraged from voting for such measures if the current energy crisis persists. So there is no real guarantee that SR 162 will be adequately enhanced in time to carry larger volumes from a new arterial

And if the Council were to approve the project today the EIS process would have to be repeated again at the project level according to the Rhodes Lake Road EIS Even if WSDOT manages to secure funding for SR 162 improvements they will have to go through the EIS process as well

What all this amounts to is that time and money will be spent contemplating a set of projects with an uncertain future. And those projects still might not deliver the needed transportation improvements. Perhaps these are signals telling us that it's time to shift gears and adopt a new mode of thinking one that emphasizes public transit options?

With these perspectives in mind we urge the Council not to approve Proposal No 2008 28s at this time

- 1 I am opposed to establishing any arterial roadways that feed into SR 162 north of Orting
- When the Alderton McMillan Community Planning Board studied the transportation plans for the Puyallup / Carbon River Valley they found that the Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT) did not have foreseeable plans to upgrade SR 162 to 4 lanes WSDOT's efforts and resources for the foreseeable future (the next ten years or so) are focused on expanding highways and transit for the existing near urban core of the Puget Sound region
- From my discussions with WSDOT planners, there is a very high cost of upgrading SR162 to 4 lanes because of the need to upgrade the SR 410 intersection with SR 167, the need to upgrade the SR 162 intersection with SR 410, widening the Puyallup river bridge near 80th Street, widening the Puyallup River Bridge near 140th Street, the cost of relocating utilities and the cost of purchasing homes along the way for Right of Way.

Thank you for your letter of April 28 2008 presented before the Pierce County Economic and Infrastructure Development Committee regarding the Rhodes Lake Road Corridor Establishment Your letter reflects a wide range of concerns and asks a number of questions regarding the Corridor establishment process assumptions analysis findings and project implementation. We would like to address a number of points made within your letter. In order to provide some context to our responses, we are providing portions of your letter in **bolded** text and County responses in *italic* font.

As I understand the permits for the plateau developments, the developers are required to provide the required transportation mitigation. The proposal for Rhodes Lake Road was for improvements to the existing structure, not a new road. I was told by Jesse (Hamashima) and others over the course of this project that Transportation Impact Fees (TIF) and other developer fees are paying for this and the accompanying assumed improvements. Explain how those fees are going to take care of it the actual dollars and why, then, you are proposing taxes for it

The current action to be considered by the County Council will determine whether or not a corridor should be established as depicted in the County Engineer's Report There are neither commitments nor agreements made at this time for the construction of any alignment However based on current practices regulations and policies it is reasonable to expect that

- 1 Should this roadway be established at least a portion of its costs will be included within the Traffic Impact Fee Program
- 2 Should this roadway be established developers will likely bear a proportionately larger share of the costs within the County's transportation impact fee program

As the financing plan for the Rhodes Lake Corridor has not been determined it is uncertain as to what the actual impact fees may be The Corridor establishment ordinance before the Council identifies only the location and estimated cost of the proposed road it does not detail how the project would be financed and does not propose any new taxes for its construction



As stated in the Final Environmental Impact Statement (FEIS), all of the assumptions must be in place to create the impact as stated. The graphs in the FEIS show the effect of each of the options including a 'no build option. The ordinance that is proposed to you today is to select Option D, the alignment that draws all the traffic from the plateau to 128th Street and SR 162. If the assumptions are not in place, it is a far worse effect than a 'no build'. You would be allowing literally thousands of vehicle trips to an already overcapacity road. This impact was not charted even though it is the most likely scenario since the State has no plans in the near or distant future to change SR 162.

The assumption that SR 162 is going to be made into a five-lane highway has the biggest impact on the success of the proposal. The FEIS states that the capacity improvements on SR 162 and SR 410 are key to the operation of the east Pierce County Road network. The County cannot make assumptions about State highways that are not consistent with the project list and timeline of the Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT). Until and unless the State changes their project list and SR 162 upgrades are included in the same time schedule as the Rhodes Lake Road project, the County cannot consider it a future reality, especially in the timeframe proposed for this project. The report further says, uncertainty in the timing of these improvements is not a reason to delay the construction of a Rhodes Lake Road Corridor. (Refer to page 14 of Appendix J.)

1 Does building a new Rhodes Lake Road Corridor make things better or worse if SR 162 and/or SR 410 have not been widened?

Any of the build alternatives will improve average condition in the study area and will therefore make things better

Where is the proof? That scenario was not proposed in the charts and graphs Please provide the scenario of conditions if the new road is built and SR 162 and/or SR 410 are not widened

As you note the FEIS for this project states that Any of the build alternatives will improve average condition in the study area and will therefore make things better. This conclusion was based on the analysis performed in the course of developing the Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS) and the FEIS. You are correct in asserting the work performed in the course of the DEIS assumed that (WSDOT) would add lanes to SR 162 and provide High Occupancy Vehicle (HOV) lanes on SR 410. As it became more apparent that the Washington State Highway Systems Plan and the failed Regional Transportation Improvement District strategy would not address these improvements the project s FEIS re analyzed the scenario with neither SR 410 or SR 162 being improved. The outcome of this is shown in Appendix J of the FEIS. This analysis compares what happens when you build the alternative corridor with the State highway system improved versus unimproved. There is little doubt that these State highways would be more congested without additional lanes. But also shown in Exhibits 6.7 and 8 of this chapter are the rationale for the establishment of the new Corridor in its comparison of build versus.

no build options The exhibits show that for each build alternative (B D and E) the delays on the key corridors and subnetwork are <u>less</u>, and the Vehicle Miles Traveled are <u>fewer</u> than on the Baseline or No Build Alternative (A) In other words the exhibits plainly show that any of the alternatives that provide additional lanes to and from the plateau even without improving the State highways would result in less overall system delay and vehicle miles travel than doing nothing

This is considering the impact only on the plateau not the valley or the SR 410 interchange at Sumner. This statement completely disregards the impact on the valley. Conditions would be seriously worsened by building this road without the assumed improvements to SRI 62 especially as noted in the statement that it is key to the success of the transportation network. Does the County value the valley the rural community, and the agricultural economy? This statement implies these issues are not a concern and are not related to this decision.

We are very concerned about the impacts of any new or improved roadway on the valley rural community and agricultural economy. These things collectivity are important underpinnings to the quality of life in the Alderton McMillin area. The proposed ordinance language and County Engineer's Report purposely focus on the concept of mitigating the impact of the new Corridor upon affected land uses. Many of the principles of mitigation found within the ordinance and County Engineer's Report address directly the concerns raised by the Alderton McMillin Community Planning Board and Puyallup Valley Preservation Conservation Group. In Appendix E of the County Engineer's Report, the County Executive documented a range of strategies that should be considered in mitigating the impacts of the roadway.

2 Does the uncertain timing for widening SR 162 and SR 410 make a different option than Alternative D a more logical Preferred Alternative? Alternative B would be the best performing alternative from a traffic perspective under the original Baseline assumptions. Its benefits for traffic would be amplified even more in the interim period before SR 162 is widened. However, Alternative D (the second best performer for traffic) was recommended by the Project Leadership Team (PLT) as the best blend of the competing goals of moving traffic east west and preserving the character of the valley. The PLT has confirmed this recommendation even in the scenario where a Rhodes Lake Road Corridor is constructed prior to improvements on SR 162 and SR 410.

How does D preserve the character of the valley better than B when D creates a whole new area of view shed destruction? B utilizes the already destroyed area of the gravel mine and Falling Water clear cut

Allowing Rhodes Lake Road to be constructed before the assumptions are in place especially the widening of SR 162 would drive commuters to use less desirable local roads such as McCutcheon Road, which is too unsafe in the roadbed and width as well as curves on the steep hillside route that is without guardrails a very hazardous scenario under the

best of conditions The same argument stated in the Engineer's Report regarding the current Rhodes Lake Road applies to McCutcheon (Road) Rhodes Lake Road East is not suitable to serve as a major arterial but given its location, travel demand will force its use as an arterial unless an alternate route is developed. In this case, an expanded SR 162 to accommodate the expected demand. McCutcheon (Road) has already seen a significant increase in traffic that has been reflected in an increase in accidents. The primary purpose of Pierce County is transportation decisions is to ensure the safety of its citizens as they travel the County roadways. You really must give this serious consideration. The Assumptions must be in place before this road is completed and it must be stated so in the ordinance. The weak verbiage as written is inadequate to assure the regular commuters or the general public that this proposed ordinance is providing for a safe roadway network.

The Project Leadership Team took a great deal of time in weighing the merits of Alternatives B and D. It was assumed that both alternatives would have an impact upon the view shed. It should be noted that while the Alderton McMillin Community Planning Board clearly did not support the concept of a roadway being built through the valley it did express a preference (note that the Board did not assert support for the alternative) for Alternative D based on its more southern geographic location. This decision was documented in the Alderton McMillin Community Planning Board recommendations

Much of the rationale for the selection of Alternative D was based on

- I The directness to the South Hill area compared to a less direct Alternative such as D In a 20 year period the South Hill area will grow in population and employment. If this level of development occurs there will be relatively strong travel demand between the South Hill area and plateau. Alternative D was not perceived as a direct enough connection between the two above areas.
- 2 The impact on farmland and neighborhood Alternative B would split a large tract of farmland and affect a neighborhood along 116th Street East. The latter roadway presently ends at the river and carries only local traffic. Alternative D certainly has its impacts upon the natural and built environment, but 128th Street East carries through traffic across the river and connects to McCutcheon Road East.
- 3 The existing bridge across the river to McCutcheon Road East The current regulatory environment would make it difficult to acquire the permitting to build a new bridge connecting 116 Street East eastward to other roadways

The WSDOT's Highway Systems Plan does not call for the widening in the next 20 years of SR 162 from SR 410 to the City of Orting. This is in recognition of the lack of available transportation funding. However, the Route Development Plan conducted for SR 162 recognized the need for five lanes on this highway based on the current and forecasted traffic volumes. Both the State and County recognize the need for the widening of SR 162. While it would be this Department's strong preference to see SR 162 widened prior to the construction of the Rhodes Lake Corridor, there is no regulatory process that enables the County to ensure this

this sequence of events As you have heard the State and local roadways are functionally linked but they are very separate entities in terms of administration operations and funding We would hope that the transportation needs for SR 162 and other roadways will become higher priority funding needs through time

Let's also take a look at the assumption of adding a climbing lane to Military Road Before that assumption should be made the County needs to ask the Transportation Department to make a realistic assessment of what that project would involve It is a challenging concept with the steep hillside, narrow right of way and number of access points in less than a mile. Once again, the County's primary responsibility is to provide safe roadways and this will be a challenging project when you consider there are 17 access points in less than one mile along a hillside that is difficult to have clear distance vision for traffic to safely turn onto or off that road. If you add a lane at what will be an exorbitant cost, and encourage hundreds more vehicles to use that route, how do you provide a safe traveling environment? How do you justify the cost/benefit of this road with these issues? I would like you to answer my questions

We agree with a number of your observations about the challenges the County may face in attempting to widen Military Road East. As you already know this project need has been identified based on the increasing volumes of traffic and is included in the Traffic Impact Fee (TIF) list. This project is necessary to support the traffic growth and designated land uses in the unincorporated areas and cities. In the end, it is our goal to develop facilities that meet design standards and prove to be safe and efficient. We do not yet know the extent of the challenges to be encountered in building these improvements. These things will be better discerned when the project goes to design

Let s also take a look at the FEIS itself and issues that were raised by the community in all of the public comment periods that the County had on this project. One of the important issues raised by the community was not included or addressed at all in the environmental impact statements. That specific issue was the noise impact. Because this is a rural community and the County has repeatedly stated on numerous occasions that it desires to retain this rural environment—it is even referred to in the Engineer's Report on page 20 the noise level is a primary issue in retaining a rural character. I am sure you know that Low Frequency Noise is generally accepted to be associated with transportation corridors. It can be felt and heard, and its presence is recognized as an environmental polluter that can negatively affect human beings and animals. Why was that environmental impact not included in the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS)? How can the noise factor of the level of traffic that has been projected for this project be mitigated?

Appendix C of the Rhodes Lake Road Corridor Study DEIS focuses on the subject of noise The technical memorandum within this appendix provides the current noise levels at a number of locations within the study area and projections of future levels with the forecasted volumes of the preferred alternative The analysis indicates that future noise levels with the constructed

corridor would exceed the State and Federal criteria for noise abatement Mitigation is discussed in this section. It is anticipated that these issues would be explored in greater detail during project design

Another aspect is the farming community and agricultural economy that the County has repeatedly and consistently said they want to support and develop. Building this highway will bring development. The safeguards you think you have put in place for retaining the farmland will not be effective in the face of this level of environmental and character compromise and degradation. The County must decide what is trump. Is the rural community and farming a higher priority than development? You can develop anywhere but you can not farm anywhere. And in light of the increasing alarm around the world for food production it puts a greater pressure to preserve this precious resource. If the County decides to build this highway it is making a clear statement to the developers that it is open season, development trumps agriculture and the rural community. It tells the farmers and landowners that all the talk about supporting farming and the rural community was just window dressing and political rhetoric. This is an opportunity to make a very clear statement to County residents and developers alike that the County is dead serious about strengthening the agricultural economy.

The County Engineer's Report cannot predict as to zoning changes that may occur in the next 20 years nor is the report a statement of land use policy or a predictor of parcels that may change in use and intensity. The travel demand model forecasts traffic demand based on future land use and propensity and to travel from place to place. One objective of the EIS and related studies is to understand how the alternative corridors would affect overall system travel. The zoning within the valley and nearby areas has and will be set by elected policy makers not this study.

Another missing piece in the FEIS is reference to the Alderton McMillin Community Plan though the Engineer's Report does acknowledge it. Though the Project Leaders claim to have worked with the Community Planning Board nothing written in the Community Plan that refers to the project is included, there is absolutely no reference at all in the FEIS to the Community Plan. Key point is that the Board unanimously and strongly agreed no new roads should be built to the valley. Another very critical issue is the retention of the valley view shed. This alignment is clearly a dreadful impact on the view shed as I already mentioned.

The concerns of the Alderton McMillin Community Board were heard in a number of venues including the open house forums and Alderton McMillin Community Planning Board meetings where Public Works and Utilities staff facilitated the transportation element. Please keep in mind however the corridor study and community plan were separate but related processes.

The objective of the County Engineer's Route Establishment work was to find the best alignment to construct it did not answer the question of whether the alignment should be constructed. We feel that this question is the task for elected officials

An issue that continues to build in concern across the County is access to public transit. As fuel prices rise, alternatives must be made available to commuters to take cars off the road and provide commute options. This proposal offers no transit opportunities. This is a great disservice to the east County residents. When you consider over 10,000 new residential units yielding approximately 20,000 new travelers a public transit option needs to be included in this study as an integral part of this project.

Pierce County strongly supports the development of a more extensive transit system that will provide more alternatives to the single occupant vehicle. The issue of whether and how transit could serve the plateau is not part of the corridor establishment. The issue of transit and other non auto related forms of travel is becoming more prominent in this region and County. It is linked however to the important issue of land use planning and its integration with transportation planning. This Department will be including more information on this issue in the next Transportation Plan Update.

Many other questions, comments and concerns have been brought to your attention in letters from the community people who have the very quality of their lives at stake herenot the people who were on the PLT whose lives were not at stake. I hope you read all of your e-mail this morning. Pay attention to these comments and concerns and multiply each by about 10 to realize the depth of sincerity and the heart and soul behind these concerns. Time does not allow me to summarize all of my concerns and additional concerns of my neighbors.

This committee needs to bring all of these concerns facts and issues into focus and remand the study to the study team to address all of the missing pieces and give more direct and specific responses to the questions the local residents your constituents, pose

Ms Herbert Hill thank you for your continued work in advocating the local community concerns about the Rhodes Lake Road Corridor Establishment My staff tells me that you have spent many hours of your time attending meetings as an Alderton McMillin Community Planning Board member and have monitored the proceedings of the PLT You have always been very engaged in this Corridor establishment as well. I very much appreciate your commitment to the issues regarding this establishment and fully realize that answers provided in this letter may not necessarily satisfy all of your concerns. We believe that the County has provided the best technical guidance on corridor location based on the proximity type and intensity of land use dictated by our land use plan. We support the continued dialogue that this project has generated and hope to work with you in resolving future questions that you may have

Whereas the Rhodes Lake Road Corndor Study environmental analysis 36 Indicates that the current zoning for the EBP¢ could realize approximately 10 300 additional residential units and 9 600 additional jobs by 2030 and

Whereas the Draft Environmental/Impact Statement (DEIS) scoping and subsequent expanded scoping for this project resulted in the consideration of additional action alternatives including the South Plateau Connection Angeline Road interchange with SR 410 and the 214th Avenue East Corridor improvements and

Whereas the DEIS released/on June 6 2007 evaluated four final alternatives 45 based on their respective impacts on traffic/mobility and impacts on the natural and built 46 environment and also considered the traffic and mobility impacts and the relative ease or difficulty in which the alternative could be implemented and

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Whereas the Rhodes Lake Road Corridor Final Programmatic Environmental Impact Study (FEIS) released on January 11 2008 provided direct responses to questions and comments generated in the course of the project's DEIS review period and

Whereas the Rhodes Lake Road Corridor Study inclusive of the DEIS and FEIS process reached the key conclusions that

- a The no build alternative would not be acceptable because of severe congestion on the Plateau and much higher volumes on the current Rhodes Lake Road East than for which the facility is suited
- b Improving the current Rhodes Lake Road East to Major Arterial standards would be very costly have high wetland impacts and be less effective for mobility than other options
- The mid valley corridor options would be most effective for meeting the future east west travel demand to and from the Plateau. These mid valley options included Alternative B (a new road off the Plateau with a new river crossing and roadway across the valley to connect into the Military Road/SR 162 intersection) and Alternative D (a new road off the Plateau connecting to the existing Puyallup river bridge at 128th Street East)
- d Alternative D offers the best balance of accommodating travel demand while minimizing impacts to people and the natural environment
- e The subject corridor would be an important part of the greater transportation network needed to serve the plateau but would need to be supplemented with other facilities at some point in the future and

Whereas the Rhodes Lake Road East New Alternative Corridor Route Establishment report recommends that the County should consider a number of specific principles in mitigating the impact of the construction of a new roadway corridor including

- a The minimization of the roadway cross section (number of lanes/width)
- b The minimization of spillover illumination


